

Celebrate the 100th Anniversary of Women's Suffrage

in Kansas and Among Mennonites by Donna Becker

Mennonite men began voting as early as 1876. The idea of voting privilege for women would not have entered their minds – men or women.

Suffrage for women amendments were submitted to the Kansas Legislature in 1897 and 1912. In both cases, Mennonites voted against adoption of the amendment. Even when Kansas granted women the vote in 1912, few Mennonite women participated. Both genders agreed that a woman's place was in the home.

Other women campaigned for women's suffrage, including the indomitable Susan B. Anthony, even before the Mennonites arrived in 1874. Carrie Chapman Catt was instrumental in securing the ratification of the 19th

Amendment to the US Constitution in 1920. Prior to the final passage, she traveled across Kansas, speaking in 102 of the 105 counties. She enlisted the help many times of Kansan Laura Johns of Salina who was chair of the Suffrage Campaign and of the Republican Women's Association. Many other Kansas women gave to the suffrage cause.

Kansas (men) gave women the right to vote in school elections in 1861. In the late 1880's women were given the vote in municipal elections, with a number of small towns electing women mayors. Included in this number were Argonia (the first in the country), Canton, Cottonwood Falls and Baldwin.

The road to equal suffrage was long and arduous, encountering fierce opposition from men in general and also women, religious, economic and industrial leaders, and the long standing view of women as less than men. Carrie's story will reveal the courage and fortitude of thousands of women over a course of 72 years to achieve this basic civil right. Mrs. Catt will be portrayed by Goessel's own Donna Unruh Becker for the 2020 Heritage Dinner on March 13, 2020. She is a certified first-person historical performer with the company Historical Echoes. Her purpose is to promote the impact of women in history who have expanded the role and voice of women to the benefit of all society.

Annual Meeting Highlights

The Museum's 2020 Annual Meeting was held at the Goessel Mennonite Church on Sunday afternoon, January 19, 2020. John Koehn was elected to the museum board. Others renewing their terms as board members were Anne Harvey, John Janzen, and Nelson Voth. Don Herick was appointed to fill out the remaining year of Howard Birky's term.

After the business meeting, D.J. & Marilyn Unruh Flaming and Myron & Ruth Goertzen recounted their 2018 trip to Poland, sharing many photos. It was a historic tour to the land where our Mennonite ancestors lived for over 200 years. Much visiting followed the program, and, of course, faspa.

What is Faspa?

When submitting news releases to the local newspapers about the annual meeting, one reporter called and inquired what the word "faspa" meant. According to the museum's *From Pluma Moos to Pie* cookbook:

"Faspa is one of those Low German words for which there is no direct English translation. Faspa meant a light lunch about 4 p.m. on workdays. Faspa also meant the gathering of family and friends, usually at 4 p.m. Sunday, for a light meal and fellowship, with an emphasis on fellowship. The meal always included zwieback and coffee and might also include cheese, cold cuts, and jelly."

Many remember the menu also including more sweets such as cookies and cakes, especially after cake mixes became popular. To honor Sunday as a day of rest, food preparations were done ahead. Visiting others was common on Sunday afternoons, so having surprise guests was taken in stride. Do you have any faspa stories to share?
